

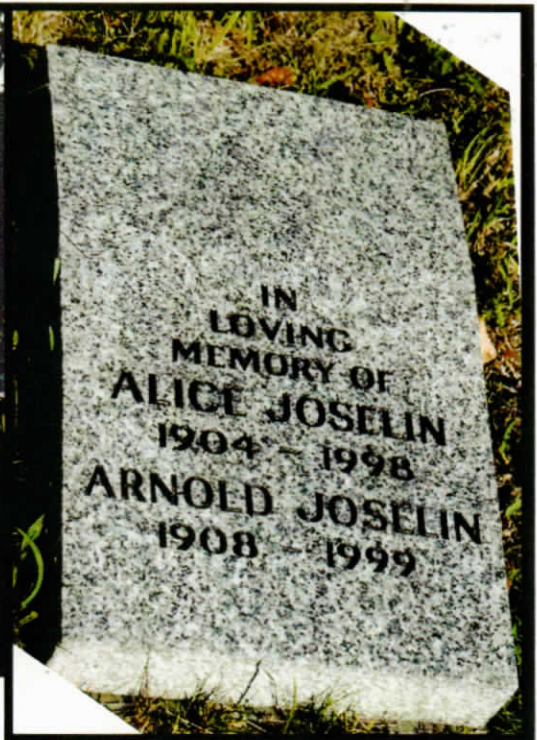

These amendments are made after considerable work by Douglas Woodyard (brother-in-law of Thelma Williams), Brenda Joscelyne and C. Averil Snodgrass. There remain several Joslens of Braughing from the 17th Century and earlier which can not be connected at present. There is a long gap in the parish registers.

ADDITIONAL JOSSELINS OF BRAUGHING

John Jocelyn, of Sheering, was born about 1430. He died before August 1524. He married Anne Lavenham and received Gatesbury Manor and Uphall. John and Anne had five children Edward, Ralph, Phillip Geoffrey and Anne. *Both of these manors are part of Braughing.* Gatesbury Manor is no longer there, but Up Hall is.

Symon Joslyn married Mary unknown (*may be widow Kendrick*). Mary was buried in Braughing churchyard 2 May 1642 and Symon was buried 22 June 1645.

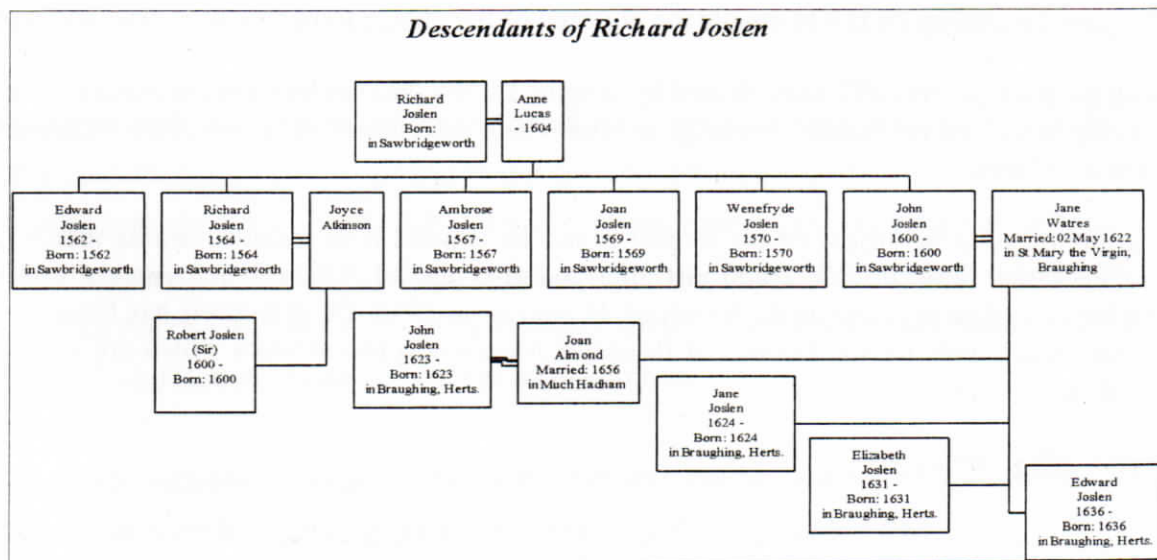

DESCENDANTS OF RICHARD JOSLEN

INQUEST INTO DEATH OF JOSEPH JOSLEN THURSDAY 4TH DECEMBER 1828

From The Herts, Huntingdon, Bedford, Cambridge and Isle of Ely Mercury of Saturday 6th December 1828

Before Mr. Longmore, coroner, an inquest was held at Braughin [sic] on view of the body of Joseph Joslin, who died of a locked jaw, on Tuesday evening. The deceased, it appeared, had quarrelled some days before with William Webb, a labourer of the same place, in the belfry of the parish church, and struck him several blows. The parties then descended to the churchyard, with other men who had been engaged in ringing, and it was said that the deceased showed an inclination to continue the quarrel with Webb, who thereupon took up two stones and threatened the deceased to throw them at him if he meddled with him again: and Webb did throw one, which hit the deceased over the left eye, and prostrated him on the ground, and caused a considerable effusion of blood, The wound was dressed, but the deceased did not apply for medical aid for sometime afterwards, nor till a locked jaw became apparent. The surgeon stated it to be his opinion, that this was a consequence of the wound, and the Jury returned a Verdict of Manslaughter against Webb, who was committed, on the Coroner's warrant, to Hertford Gaol for trial at the approaching Assizes.

JOSSELINS ON TV AND RADIO RECENTLY

John Joslin (178) and **Ben Joscelyne (09)** were interviewed on BBC Radio Essex on May 5 during Steve Scruton's afternoon programme which, for the week in question, was based on the presenters and members of the public walking the Essex Way, an across-the-County long distance footpath.

This arose from an advertisement that **Peter Joslin (29)** placed on behalf of the Society in the Essex Family Historian to publicise our Summer meetings. The broadcast was from Terling in the grounds of the village school.

Both Ben and John explained that Joslins and Joscelynes had been living in the locality and in Essex for several hundred years and stemmed from the main family who were at Sawbridgeworth for six centuries and prior to that from the continent of Europe. Steve Scruton launched straight into the conversation without any pre discussion but all went well and he encouraged mention of our forthcoming meetings and how to contact the Society by phone and website.

One of the stops by the walkers en route was at the Terling windmill, now converted into a house. Off air, John recalled as a boy when he saw Will Hay the comic actor making the film "Oh, Mr Porter!" and in the chase sequence at the windmill Hay actually went round on the moving sails. John was born in the village of an agricultural family and retired as a Manager for parts of Lord Rayleigh's Estate.

Ben, also off air as the interview was short, recalled that an earlier Benjamin Joscelyne of Terling in his Will of 1780 gave an annuity of £10 to enable the children of the village to be taught to read and write.

Brian Joscelyne (06) has recently been filmed by Anglia TV for their series of programmes "The Way We Were" being broadcast on Sunday evenings at 6pm which uses family film and news archives made during the last 100 years.

Brian's contribution is to be broadcast on August 6 and he expects it to include various motor racing clips shot by his father both pre WW2 and just after and also possibly of the Essex Agricultural Show which his father helped to organise at High Garrett, Braintree, in 1938. Brian himself has filmed a number of films on local events for the Friends of Braintree Museum in recent years which are available at the Museum shop.

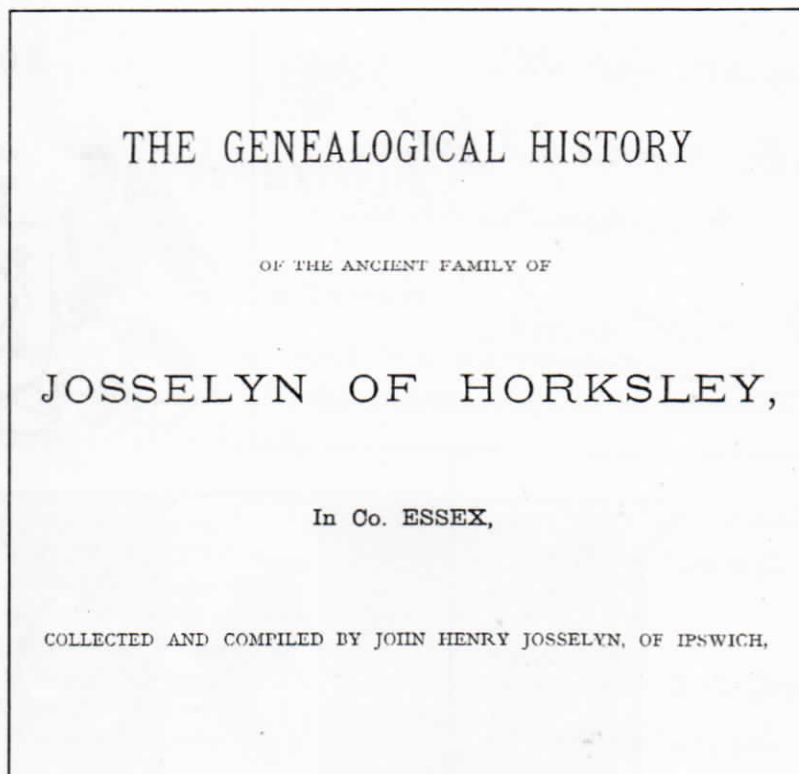

Lord Roden brought this book to my attention last year. He sent me photocopies of all the pages. I immediately contacted abe.books.com and to my amazement struck gold. The leather bound volume with loose boards is illustrated on pages 5-9 and on the photograph page. My book contains the original letter to the Hon. Major Augustus G. F. Jocelyn from John Henry Josselyn of Ipswich dated 24th Sept. 1883 and numerous handwritten amendments and sheets tipped in on almost every page. I sent a photo copy of my copy to Lord Roden whose copy is still as the original.

The Hon. Major Augustus George Frederick Jocelyn was the second son of the second wife of the 2nd. Earl of Roden and uncle of John Strange, the 5th Earl of Roden who s. 1880.

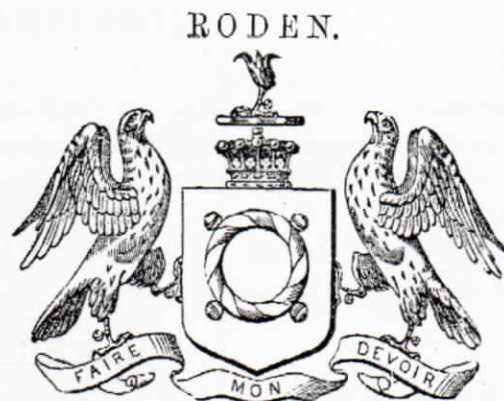

I have your note of the 20th from
 Inghymore Park and have great pleasure in

 Genealogical History of the Horkeley branch
 of our family which I have added a

 work was printed.

I think it must be extremely rare to trace
 a collateral kinship after the lapse of hundreds
 of years and I was both surprised and
 gratified at my success in the attempt
 achieved so satisfactorily and in comparatively
 so short a time -

Sir D. Burke had made great mistakes

in the early genealogy of the family but
 in his edition for this year (1883) he has
 I think put it right at last.

I am sorry we cannot really claim a
 genuine descent from the great Emperor
 of the West but it seems true that
 Lodge must be all wrong in his very
 early history of the family on that point.

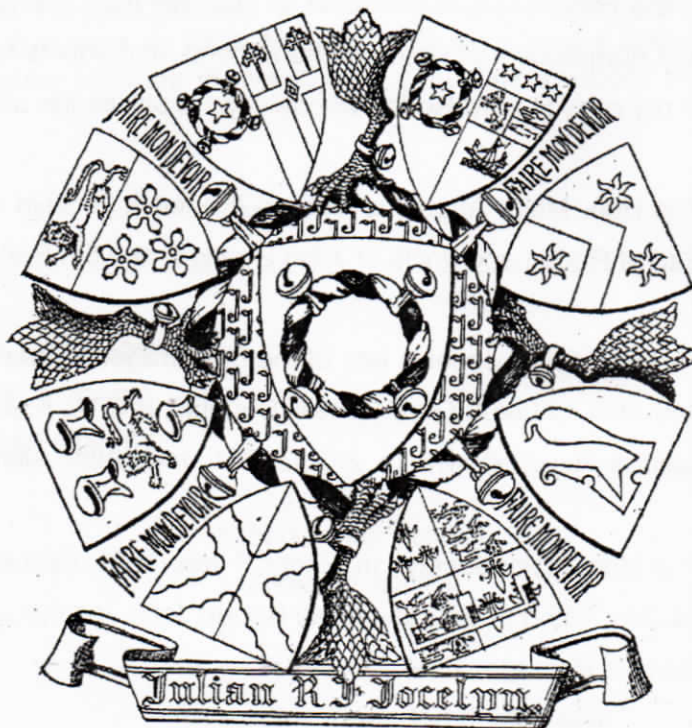

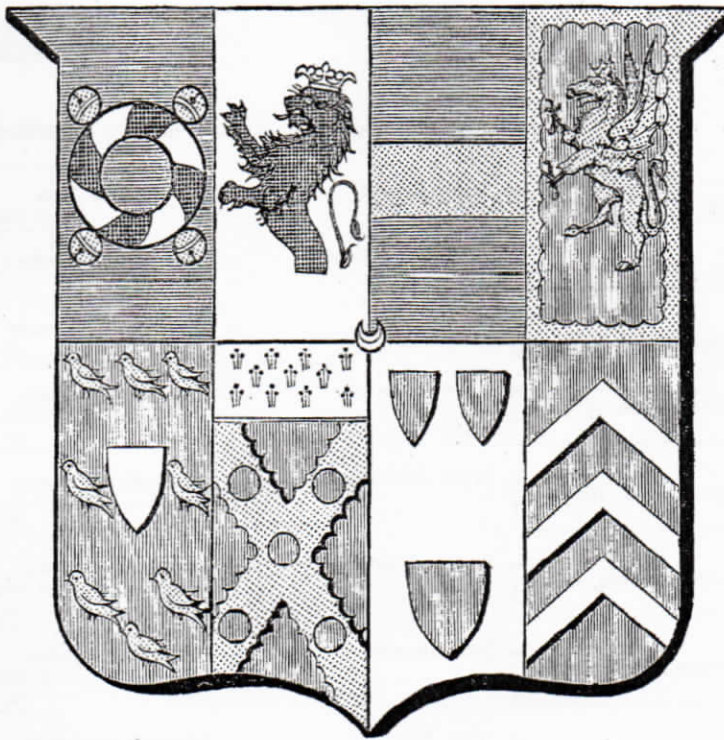

On the Shield depicted below are copied from the ancient silver seal of the Josselyn family in the possession of John Josselyn, Esq., of St. Edmund's Hill, near Bury St. Edmund's, in Co. Suffolk.



THE BLAZON

Is given in Harleian MSS., 6065, fo. 138, as follows:—

One coat of eight quarterings (viz.):—1st, JOCELIN, Azure, a circular wreath[†] argent and sable, with four hawks' bells in quadrature or. 2nd, Argent, a demi-lion sable, ducally crowned or, for JOCELIN. 3rd, Azure, a fesse or, for CHASTELIN. 4th, Gules, a griffin segreant within a bordure engrailed or, for BATTAYLE. 5th, Gules, an inescutcheon argent within an orle of martlets or, for ENFIELD. 6th, Gules, on a saltire engrailed or five bezants, a chief ermine, for HYDE. 7th, Argent, three escutcheons, 2 and 1 gules, for PATEMERE. 8th, Gules, three chevrons argent, for BAUDE.

[†] In Harl. Vis. Essex, Josselyn ped. no. 2. this wreath is called "a josselyn". I believe it to be almost if not quite unique as an heraldic device and know of no other family bearing anything resembling it.

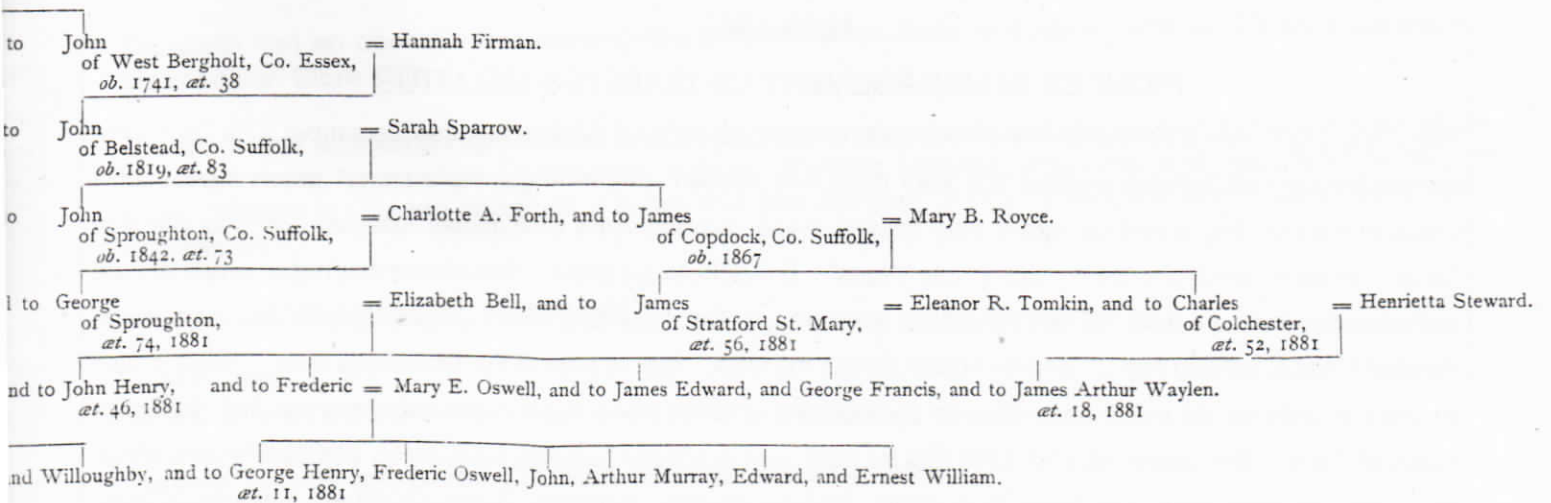

PIONEER IN MANAGEMENT OF DIABETES MELLITUS

Ray Joslin (133) sent a cutting from the front page of the *LAS VEGAS SUN* of Monday December 12th 2005 concerning the care of diabetes mellitus. The front page was headed "Diabetics gaining a friend" above a photo of a pretty woman loading a syringe and a side column listing characteristics of diabetes mellitus. The sub title was "Joslin Center is opening satellite office in Las Vegas" by Michelle Swafford. She stated that higher levels of care and education for more than 167,000 Nevadans would result. The Joslin Diabetes Center in Boston (associated with Harvard Medical School) has 25 affiliate offices across the USA., "mostly east of the Mississippi river". There is also an office in Bahrain. An inside page showed photographs of latest blood sugar meters above a heading "Diabetics Focus of Care". The centre will cost \$250,000 for staff, rent & support services followed by \$1million dollars annually. "No one does team care better than Joslin. Endocrinologists, dieticians, nurse educators, ophthalmologists, mental health workers, podiatrists and exercise specialists" work together. "Diabetes is not limited to certain religions, genders, economic levels or races or ethnicities- but blacks, Hispanics and American Indians are at higher risk of developing the disease".

If it is true that no such comprehensive management is available to patients in Las Vegas it is a terrible indictment of American Medicine. Joslin Management began from before his first edition of "The Diabetic Manual" in 1912.!!!

CHILDREN EVACUATED TO THE DOMINIONS IN 1940

Between July and September 1940 2664 children were evacuated to the Dominions under the "CORB" scheme (Children's Overseas Reception Board). In the March 2005 Historian Supplement published by The Essex Society for Family History are listed 222 children from Essex that went to Australia, Canada, New Zealand or South Africa. These records are held by the National Archives, Kew and the following are from Canada DO 131 108 CORB no 1156, 1157 and 1158.

CENSUS AND OTHER INFORMATION ON THE INTERNET

When recently researching my two paternal Great Grandmothers families, I have been able to find 75 new names, all connected, and all ascertained by use of three websites, one free to use and two by subscription:

The International Genealogical Index (IGI) from www.familysearch.org

This is the free site of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints and although by no means comprehensive, it does list an enormous number of births and marriages, and a few deaths, mainly in the pre-Civil Registration years, i.e. before 1837. It is fully indexed, although searches sometimes have to be made through many entries, and copies can be downloaded. Whether single or widowed at marriage or death is not stated. Most of the members of my above families have been located in Suffolk which County seems to be particularly well covered by the IGI.

Of course, if your family were in one area it does help to have copies of the relevant microfiche pages for the main surname so that families can then be built up quite readily. These could be obtained from the relevant County Record Office and most major libraries also have the microfiches..

www.ancestry.co.uk

The main advantage of this site is that it carries all the 10 year England and Wales and Channel Isles Censuses from 1841 to 1901, all fully indexed. The actual pages can be seen, moved around and enlarged for easier viewing. Again, they can be printed off.

As you will no doubt know, the Census information in these years (other than 1841) includes ages (sometimes not always accurate), occupations (and occasionally the number of employees, farm acreages, etc), addresses (although not always specific), relationships in the family, whether married or not, and importantly birthplace.

Where in-laws are staying, a lead is then given to maiden names which is particularly useful. Watch out for slight variations in name spelling - you can search exactly or closely. The 1841 Census only gives names, ages, some occupations and whether born in the County or not. {Editor: Watch for remarriages in in-laws. In Census 1841 the ages are in 5 year intervals except for infants but this rule is not always adhered to.}

Ancestry also has Pallots Marriage Index (1780-1837) although this is of limited use, some early UK and Irish Parish Record information, Images of the Births, Marriages and Deaths (BMD) Registers since 1837 (although these can only be viewed in quarterly pages for each year under a particular surname), and a searchable Births, Marriages and Deaths Index 1984 - 2000.

Particularly useful is a BMD Index to names from 1837 to 1983 although this is not yet comprehensive. One feature is to show the several names on the Marriage Register page for the person you are looking for which will then often also give the name of the spouse. However the names on the page are listed alphabetically, so do not jump to conclusions as to whom married whom from the usual 4 or 6 names listed.

An annual subscription costs £69.95 (at May 2006) Shorter term subscriptions are also available. This subscription covers the United Kingdom data; this is only a small part of the world-wide site.

This is the site of the Society of Genealogists and a subscription for British and Irish information costs £34.50 for a year. British only is £22.50 for the year. Shorter periods available. Scottish info is free.

This site has been the only one carrying the 1841 Census until that was recently also put on line on by Ancestry. Other information on the site includes the 1871 Census, Boyd's Marriage Index 1538-1840, Boyd's London Burials 1538-1853, also some Apprentice Records, Marriage Licences and Wills. May 2006. JOSELYNE, CHARLES H. , played the Grand Inquisitor in "The Gondoliers" with the Bishops Stortford Operatic Society in February 1923. See *The Hertfordshire Mercury of 10th February 1923*, with photograph (not reproducible for this journal).

GOSLIN, IAN HOLTON died suddenly on 1.2.2006 at 31, La Grand Ville 56460, La Chapelle Caro. *Daily Telegraph* 4.2.2006.

STEVENS, SIR JOCELYN. Chairman of English Heritage 1992-2000 was 74 on 14.2.2006. *Daily Telegraph*.

GOSLIN, WALTER b. Bath, was aged 25 years and a Gunner in The Royal Horse Artillery 1871 *Census of London*.

GOSLING, CAPT. SIR DONALD . Joint Chairman, National Car Parks, 1950-98, was 75 on 2.3.2005. *Daily Telegraph*.

JOCELIN, "the Queen's brother". The Soke of Winchester. An Aquagium was a species of water rate paid by certain mills for their mill races and apparently the ground on which they were built. In the reign of King John the Aquagium amounted to £4.00, £1 each being paid by the Mills of the Hospital of St. Cross, [by] Jocelin the Queen's brother, [by] William de Mohun and [by] the Abbess of St Mary. Footnote: "This was Jocelin who obtained from Henry I's widow, Queen Adeliza, the honour of Petworth and was ancestor of the Percys". In 1235 Jocelin's mill, which Henry Prince then held in fee, paid 26s.8d , but as a rule each of these mills during the 13th century paid £1 as the normal rate. *VCH Hampshire & the Isle of Wight Vol. Five. William Page (ed.) Constable. 1912.*

PRITTLEWELL. The tomb of Saxon King Sigeberht of the 7th Century, was excavated during the widening of the A1159 at Prittlewell. Bronze jugs and plates, gold foil crosses were part of the rich grave goods. The tomb is to be covered by a ten foot embankment which has caused much protest. *Current Archaeology No 202 (Vol. XVII No. 10) March/April 2006.*

COLCHESTER. Roman Britain's first circus of c. AD 200 is uncovered south of the house of John Joslin, antiquarian and founder of Colchester Museum's collection of Roman artefacts. See *Josselin Journal Issue 24 Christmas 2002 pages 2-3. Ibid.*
