#### VISIT TO THE BATTLEFIELDS AROUND YPRES, BELGIUM

On Saturday 14<sup>th</sup> October Nick and I went by coach to Ypres Belgium for two days and on the way there we visited Talbot House in Poperinghe where the Toc H movement started. We were made very welcome, just like the men would have been during WW1 and Major Francis John Joslin Queen's Own (Royal West Kent Regiment) may have been one of those men. There is a framed poem by Donald Hodge of the Royal West Kent Regiment 1914-1919 written in 1997 (picture 1) which indicates that the regiment had visited the 'old house' at sometime. At the very top of the building, up a very narrow almost vertical ladder, is the Chapel, were anyone could go for private prayer. After a couple of hours in Poperinghe we continued our journey arriving in Ypres with plenty of time to explore the town and have a very good meal before attending the Last Post played under the Menin Gate at 20.00 hours. The Menin Gate is an impressive British war memorial with nearly 55,000 names of missing soldiers inscribed on its panels, including Major Francis John Joslin, Alfred Charles Joslin (Josselin Journal Issue 22) and Hubert William Joslin (pictures 2, 3 & 4).

On Sunday we went on the coach around the Battlefields surrounding Ypres with a Blue Badge guide, who was very informative and he made the four hours very interesting. Our first stop was Essex Farm were there are over 1,000 UK graves and include eight graves, in a tight line, of riflemen from the King's Royal Rifle Corps who died 13 March 1916. The British and Commonwealth memorials and war cemeteries were laid out by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission who continue to maintain them. The Commission chose a uniform headstone (2 ft 6 ins high, 1 ft 3 ins broad) bearing, when known, the regimental badge, name, rank, number, date of birth and death, religious emblem and a personal inscription which the family could chose. At first the bereaved family were charged 31/2d per letter for this inscription, but it became apparent that this was beyond the means of some families, so the charge became 'voluntary'. The stones were laid out, in most cases, in straight lines, giving the appearance of a battalion on parade. All large CWGC cemeteries will have a 'Cross of Sacrifice' (picture 5) surmounted by a bronze (nowadays made in plastic) Crusader's sword. Also 'the Stone of Remembrance' (picture 6) designed by Lutyens and Kipling chose its inscription from Ecclesiastics, 'Their name liveth for ever- more'. On the left of the cemetery between a private house and the Yser Canal are some concrete bunkers, which were used as a dressing station from 1915 to1918 (picture 7). It was difficult to imagine what it must have been like as it is now so spotlessly clean, but overgrown. It was at this spot that Col. John McCrae wrote his well-known poem 'In Flanders Field' which was first published in Punch in December 1915. Our next stop was Klaprozenveld the site of the Yorkshire trench and dugout. It is in the middle of an industrial area and when you descend into the trenches it is very difficult to image what it must have been like. The deep dugouts were underground constructions on the British front line and used as brigade or battalion HQ's. Now flooded, the dugouts are two flights of steps down leading to two corridors 10 metres below ground level with eleven small and large rooms. Our next stop was Tyne Cot Cemetery on the Passchendale Ridge, the largest British war cemetery in the world. The 'Cross of Sacrifice' is built on top of an old German pillbox. Between the 'Cross of Sacrifice' and the 'Stone of Remembrance' are the original graves and our guide told us it was a very special place. Among those buried here is Private Alfred Joslin of the Suffolk Regiment (picture 8). After some lunch in Ypres we visited the 'In Flanders Fields Museum'. It was very well worth a visit but by this time we could not absorb any more facts and figures. On our way home our coach driver Mike was kind enough to make a small detour to visit Lijssenthoek Military Cemetery were I had told him L A Joscelyne was buried. Mike was first of the coach and after five minutes half the coach were trying to find Lawrence's grave. Although well marked out you have to get use to the numbering system. Eventually Mike found the grave and we were able to pay our respects (picture 9). We found the weekend a sad occasion but we were glad we had been and when we have a free weekend we hope to return and pay our respects to other 'Joslins' who died in the Great War.





#### JOSSELINS IN NORTH AFRICA IN WWII

#### FROM C. A. SNODGRASS & BRENDA JOSCELYNE

British and Commonwealth casualties who died in North Africa are buried in several War Cemeteries, including Tunisia, Libya and Egypt. The following are Josselins who are known to have died there.

Private Henry Gosling, aged 26, number 4612595 2nd. Battalion West Yorkshire regiment (Prince of Wales's Own), died 23.8.1942. He was the son of Charles Henry and Isabella Gosling. Grave/Memorial Reference XXIV. C. 8. El Alamein War Cemetery, Egypt.

Flight Sergeant Reginald Thomas Gosling, aged 22, number 1339870, Royal Air Force Volunteer Reserve, died 13.4.1944. He was the son of Albert George and M. Gladys Gosling; husband of Wanda I. Gosling of Winnipeg, Manitoba, Canada. Grave/Memorial Reference Column 279 Al Alamein Memorial, Egypt.

Signalman James Newbury Jocelyn, aged 33, number 22542 of the NZ Corps of Signals, died on Saturday 18 July 1942. He was the son of Charles Jocelyn and Mary McPherson McKay Jocelyne (nee Crabbe) Of Bannockburn, Otago, New Zealand. Grave/Memorial Reference 1. G. 2. El Alamein, Egypt. Lance Corporal Frank Joslin, aged 30, number 7883701 of the 5th Unit Royal tank Regiment. R.A.C. died 8.7.1942. He was the son of Mr. & Mrs. Edmund Joslin; husband of Ethel May Joslin of Stow-on-the-Wold, Gloucestershire. Grave/Memorial Reference XIII. D. 15. El Alamein War Cemetery, Egypt. Private Leslie John Joslin, aged 24, No. 1558644 of 110 Coy. Pioneer Corps died on 23.2.1943. He

was the son of Frederick Thomas and May Joslin of Boreham, Essex.

#### LIBYAN CEMETERIES

Acroma Knight Bridge Cemetery in Tobruk. Located 25 Km to the west of Tobruk. One of the biggest cemeteries. 3649 persons representing twelve nationalities, mostly English. "A lady nurse and some other persons buried in this cemetery carry the Bravery Medal: the Cross (VC)."

British Commonwealth Cemetery, Benghazi is in two parts viz. civilian and military. It contains 1700 graves.

**Tobruk Cemetery** contains 2479 graves of which 750 are of Australians. The rest are from New Zealand, Poland, etc.

The German Cemetery near Tobruk contains about 7000 German graves.

The French Cemetery near Tobruk contains 200 French, some Algerians and Moroccans.

The Greek Cemetery has 36 Greeks killed by a German aircraft. Greeks are also buried in Tobruk Cemetery.







# A STEAM REMOVALS SERVICE By Brian Joscelyne.



The house removal service was begun by Henry Joscelyne, the furnishers, about a century ago in Braintree. In 1900 the local builder, Job Enness, erected a brick building in New



Street and it was known ever since as the "New Warehouse". Soon after this a pantechnicon van was purchased and my grandfather Lewis Henry subsequently wrote "I gained some expensive experience regarding horses!"

Owing to the expansion of the removals business it became necessary to introduce steam traction. A five ton steam trac-

tion engine was bought in 1910 and housed in a shed in the Corn Exchange yard. To provide room for a steam wagon and trailer vans, two very dilapidated cottages, numbers 15 and 17 New Street, were gutted in 1911, an approach road made, and an iron building erected over the old garden. During the First World War Joscelyne's steam engine and steam wagon were commandeered by the War Department and used for government transport. In 1919 these steam engines were sold. And henceforth, motor transport took the place of steam.

The picture of a major house removal involving steam powered traction engines is shown on page 14. I wondered where it was and when. Luckily I found the answers through my cousin Melvyn Joscelyne who was managing director of Henry Joscelyne Ltd. In its final years. He identified the grand house as Skreens Park, just a mile or two west of Roxwell village which is only four miles north-west of Chelmsford. The year was thought to be about 1910 and the owners, who Melvyn could not name, were moving "lock, stock and barrel" to Great Horkesley some four miles north of Colchester. The entire contents fitted no less than 44 van loads!

The way this massive operation must have been achieved is via the railway system which at that time covered most of the country. The steam driven wagons would have hauled two trailer wagons each, as seen in the picture, the four miles to Chelmsford station where they

would have been loaded on to flat wagons to make up a complete train. This would have taken the main line to Colchester station where they would have been unloaded ands delivered to the new address four miles away. As can be imagined, this needed a lot of manpower and an early start to get the boilers going. Steam was the source of power for the whole journey with both the traction engines and rail locomotives being coal fired.

As a footnote to this episode I wondered what became of these removal wagons after the steam era ended. Well, two of them resided for 65 years under the iron roofed building at the bottom of the service yard of the furniture shop. One was used as an office and the other for storage, that is until 1982 when Henry Joscelyne Ltd ceased business after trading for 205 years. At this point they were offered to the Stour Valley railway Centre, now known as the East Anglian Railway Museum at Chappel and Wakes Colne Railway Station. In December 1982 these one and a half ton containers were raised on to low loader lorries and delivered to the station, this event being recorded by the "East Anglian Daily Times" paper.

On September 17th, I made a visit to Chappel Station to video the Museum's steam train in action. Whilst there I met on e of the volunteers in the Chappel North signal box who was himself involved in getting the containers from Braintree. He told me that one of the containers later got burnt but some of the vital parts survived to help with restoration of the remaining one. Before too much longer it is hoped this will be restored to its original chocolate and cream livery complete with its telephone number of that time, Braintree 25. And it will remind the young generation of today that containerisation is nothing new.

The Essex Record Office sent the following reply to the editors queries about Skreen's house. They wish for a copy of the article when published.

"Skreens was the ancestral home of the Bramston family, but was sold in about 1908 to a William Otho Nicholson Shaw, who we understand came from Cheshire. Shaw made major additions to the house, but died on 11 April 1910. Probate was granted on 22 July 1910 to his widow Marie Odette Shaw and Sir Harry Holdsworth Rawson, but we do not have a copy of Shaw's will. The estate was put up for sale in 1914, and within a few years the house had been demolished, although the exact date is unknown. This last period in its existence is made mysterious by a complete lack of records, but the removal in c.1910 is presumably associated with the Shaws leaving the house. Where they went, and whether anyone succeeded them in occupation, we do not know."

#### CORRESPONDENCE WITH THE EDITOR

#### JOSLINS IN BARRIE, ONTARIO

From Doug Joslin, Barrie, Ontario. (112)

Averil:

As editor of the Barrie & Northern Ontario Chapter Newsletter of Canadian National Railway Pensioners Association I included the following article in [the] first edition for 2007. My father, Roy Joslin, b. 24 October 1901, Cooper's Falls, Ontario, was the grandson of Thomas Joslin, b. 6 June 1842, Ashreigney, Devon, who arrived in Canada in June 1852.

"For Christmas my oldest granddaughter gave me a copy of Beautiful Barrie, The City and its People, An Illustrated History of Barrie, Ontario, by Su Murdoch, Brad Rudachyk, and Kurt Schick. Leafing through it on Christmas Day, I noticed a photograph of the Barrie Business College - Class of 1920 – the year my father graduated. The next day I closely examined the photo with a magnifier and found him. He first attended the business college in the fall of 1917, but did not have enough money for tuition and went to work on the construction of the Trent Canal for two years. He was 18 that spring and after graduation was employed by the Canadian Northern Express Company in Barrie as a clerk. He went to Toronto the same year to the Express Department of the Grand Trunk Railway, which became Canadian National Railways in 1923. He worked at various locations in southern Ontario with CN Express as cashier, chief clerk, agent, traffic supervisor, and general agent and resided in Hamilton and Toronto. When he retired in October of 1966 he was Assistant General Superintendent of Canadian National Express. While attending the Barrie Business College in 1920, his family lived in Hawkestone, where his father Tom Joslin was the village blacksmith. He rode the train daily between Hawkestone and Barrie. The school was quite close to the station, at the southeast corner of Dunlop and Toronto Streets."

Doug writes:

Aveil: My granddaughter was unaware of the photo or that her great grandfather had attended school in Barrie, and I was not aware the photo was in the county archives. I am able to obtain a copy of the photo from the Simcoe County Archive, however, they have advised copyright protection would not allow second usage. I am sending separately, a photo taken the same year, 1920, of my parents Margaret Wilson and Roy Joslin. This would be 3 years before their marriage July 2, 1923.

#### THE SHOP TAX 1785—1789

William Pitt, prime minister and chancellor of the exchequer, proposed a retail shop tax in 1785. The National Debt was rising owing to the American War of Independence and this tax was estimated to yield at least £120,000 per annum, more than a quarter of the debt. Based on the rental value of the property in which the business was conducted whether the shop was part or all of the property. Excluded were shops selling bread, meal and flour alone and shops under £5 rental value. The tax was graded. £5—£9 charge 6d in the £ per annum


