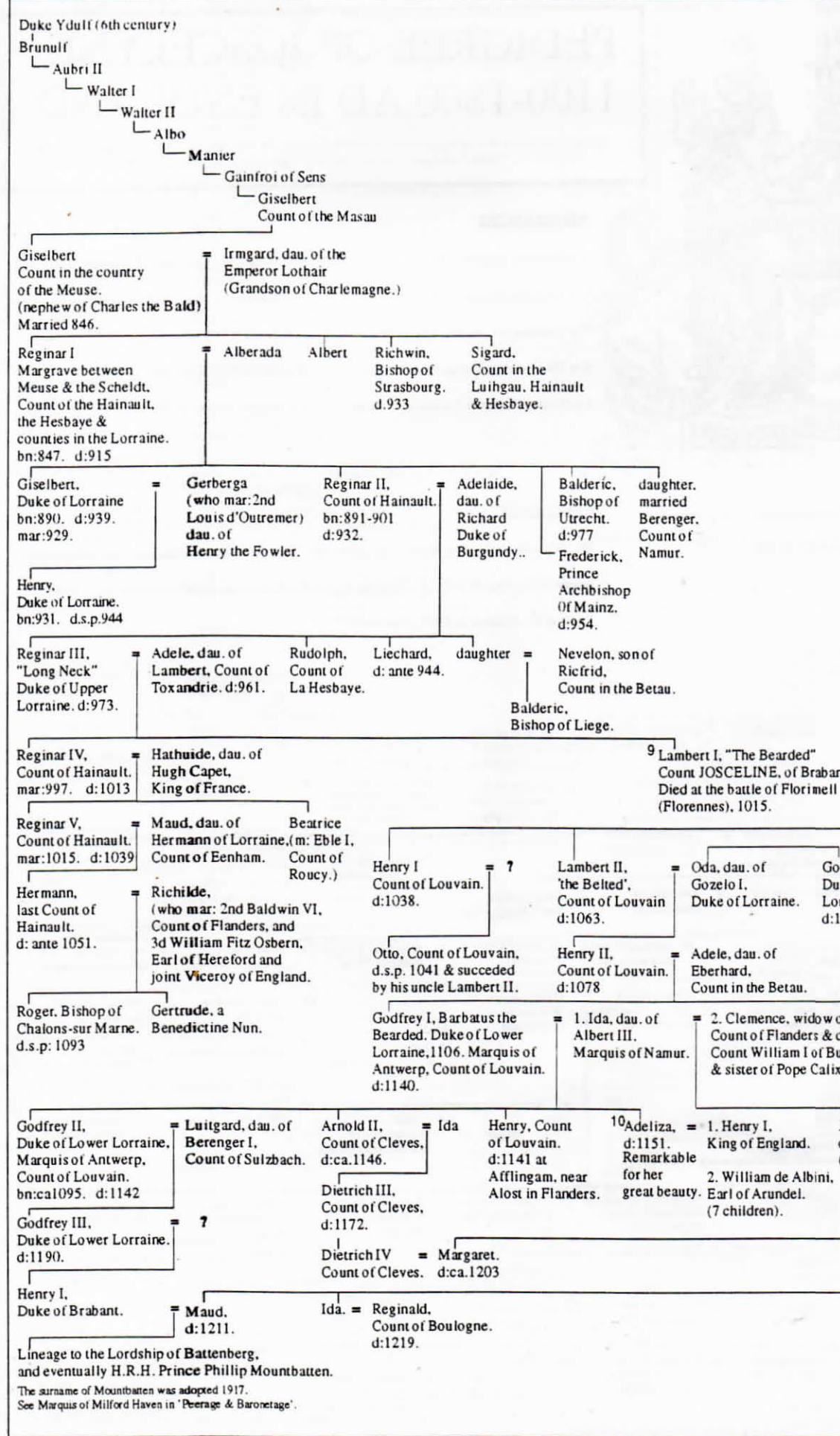
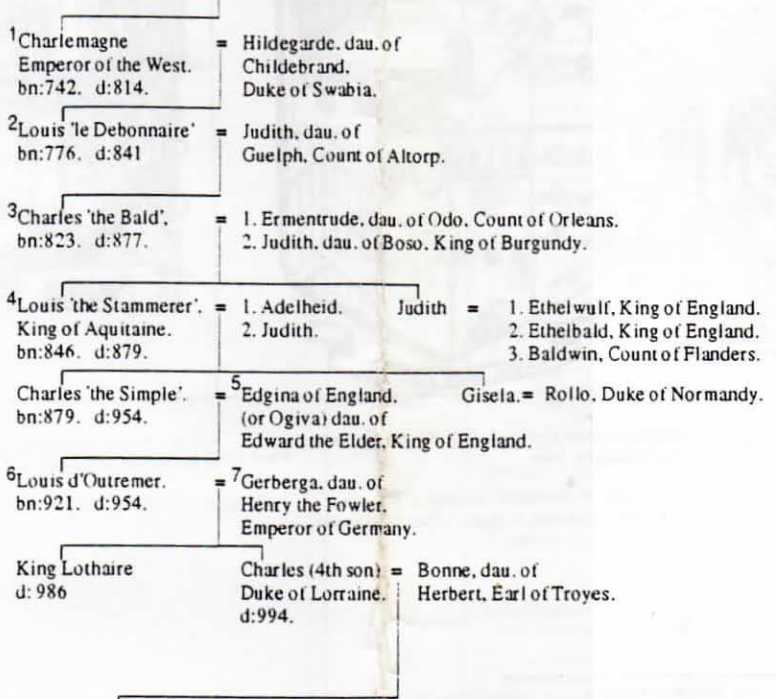


PEDIGREE OF JOSCELYNE 400BC - 1200AD IN EUROPE

Recorded back to Antenor, King of Cimmerians, a people inhabiting the shores of the sea of Azof, now known as the Crimea. Lived BC 443.



NOTES:

1. Charlemagne, King of the Franks 768 - 814. On 25 December 800 he was made Emperor of the Holy Roman Empire by Pope Leo. This gave succeeding Popes a precedent for greater temporal supremacy. Died 814 at Aix-La-Chapelle.
2. Louis, Emperor of the Holy Roman Empire and the King of Aquitaine.
3. Charles' empire was divided between Charles and his older brother. Charles was King and crowned Emperor of the Holy Roman Empire by Pope John in 875.
4. Louis, King of Neustria, composed of Normandy and a large part of Brittany.
5. Edgina, daughter of Edward the Elder of England, grand-daughter of Alfred the Great. Charles, King of Neustria for 22 years, settled with invading Norsemen by ceding to them Normandy. Rollo, chief of the Normans, became Duke of Normandy and vassal of Charles.
6. Louis, King of Neustria and Aquitaine. He was born and educated in England (d'outremer means "from beyond the sea.")
7. Gerberga, married first Giselbert, Duke of Lorraine bn. ca. 890 & mar. 920. Giselbert was son and heir to Reginar I, Margrave between the Meuse and the Scheldt, Count of Hainault, the Hesbaye and several other counties in Lotharingia (Lorraine). Gerberga married Louis (6. above) second.
8. Gerberga inherited Brussels and the land where the battle of Waterloo was fought.
9. Lambert, whose life had been one of sacrifice and violence, was defeated and killed by Godfrey, Duke of Lorraine, at Florennes in September 1015.
10. Among those who accompanied Adeliza to England were her chancellor Godfrey, who in 1123 became Bishop of Bath, and her half brother Joscelin the Castellan.
11. Eustace II, at the time of the Domesday Book, 1087, held both Pleshey and Saffron Walden castles in Essex, together with Orger.
12. Godfrey de Bouillon refused to wear a crown or assume the title of King or any other ensigne of royal dignity in the city where Christ wore a crown of thorns.
13. Baldwin I, Prince of Edessa, was "a knight of great stature, of a noble presence and lofty spirit, well imbued with letters, celebrated for his valor and worth, and of illustrious descent."
